Select **one** of the following questions and use a quote to support your argument:

- 1. Cherrie Moraga states that "the danger lies in ranking the oppressions" (44). Discuss whether you agree or disagree with Cherrie Moraga's suggested strategy for avoiding the ranking of oppressions, and give textual evidence to support your claim.
- 2. Does Moraga argue that Mexican American/Chicano culture is more oppressive for women than Anglo American/white/mainstream culture? Make a strong argument and support it with evidence.
- 3. In "A Long Line of Vendidas," Moraga argues for "a right to passion" (126). Is this a radical idea? Why or why not?
- 4. Compare and/or contrast those held responsible for the plight of farm workers and the food injustices in the U.S., according to Seth Holmes and Cherríe Moraga.
- 5. *Heroes and Saints* includes a gay character, Mario. How can you connect homophopia or heteronormativity with the farm worker's problems in this play?
- 6. State whether you agree or disagree with the protest methods used in this play (the crucifixion of the dead children). What does this practice say about the idea of death in relation to the challenges the farm worker community faces?
